Take it to a parade and wave it to the parade participants.	Make a fruit salad. Have your child talk about the types of fruits to put into a salad. Then, go shopping for the fruits, and prepare the salad.	
	Play in a sprinkler.	Feed the ducks or birds. Try to imitate the animal sounds.	Pick some berries, and make a healthy smoothie.	Play toss with water balloons. Work on catching and throwing.	Make homemade pizza using tortillas as the crust. Use sauce, cheese, and vegetables. Name your pizza creation.	
	Collect shells or rocks. Write numbers under the shells or rocks, and have your child match them.	Create an outdoor concert. Use pots, pans, rubber bands, utensils, etc. to create different sounds.	Use shaving cream to ‘paint’ shaving cream clouds on a mirror. Talk about how the shaving cream feels.	Play flashlight tag. Use flashlights to chase and tag each other.	Have a movie and popcorn night. Have your child select the movie and enjoy together as a family.	
	Watch the sun setting. Then, draw a picture of what you see.	Practice cutting with scissors by using only paint sample. Simply cut each paint strip along the line.	Family Library Day. Take a walking trip to the Oxford Library to check out some books. You can hear a story read if you visit at 10:30 AM for story time.	Practice tying your shoes.	Fishing with tongs. Fill a small pail with plastic alphabet letters in water. Have your child use a pair of tongs to pull each letter from the pail and name them.
