

Bibliographies & Citations

A **bibliography** is a **list of all sources you used** to find facts during your research.

A **citation** is **specific information about each source that you used**, such as the title, author, etc.

Tips:

*** If no author is listed, start with the title of the book or article.**

*** List your sources in ABC order.**

Book Citation Format: 5 Parts

Author's Last Name, Author's First Name.

Book Title.

City Where Published:

Publisher,

Year Book Was Published.

Example: Palacio, R.J.. Wonder. New York: Alfred A. Knopf, 2012.

You Try It:

Website Citation Format: 7 Parts

Author's Last Name, Author's First Name.

"Article Title."

Website Title.

Website Publisher,

Date Month Year Article was Published,

<Full Website URL Address>.

Date Month Year Date Accessed.

You Try It:

Paraphrasing, Quoting, & Plagiarism

Paraphrasing - rewriting information into your own words and showing where you got it.

Quoting - Copying something word for word inside quotation marks (" ") and showing where you found your information.

Plagiarism - Using someone else's words (either paraphrased or quoted) and not showing where you found your information.
