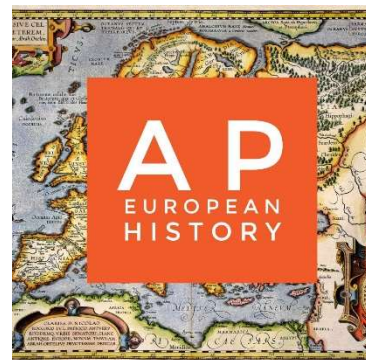

- ✓ **Key terms/people:** Provide a detailed, complete description of each assigned term
- ✓ **Source Analysis:** Provide thoughtful, analytical complete sentences that are relevant to the prompts about each assigned primary/secondary source
- ✓ **Focus questions:** Think constructed response, with a bit less “construction”. These are text-based, short answer questions that ask you to thoughtfully present your comprehension of the assigned text. You should be able to write a minimum of four sentences for each of these questions.

You may type or handwrite your responses. By the start of the school year, have a notebook you have acquired to dedicate just to AP Euro—you will likely use the whole notebook and then some.

When you come to retrieve your textbook, please have an email **that you will check** over the summer that you can provide me. Your school email is fine, so long as you will check it weekly for updates from me.
