## Poetry Devices: Key Vocabulary

- <u>Rhyme</u> words with the same ending sound.
- <u>Rhyme Scheme</u> rhyming patterns of stanzas in a poem.
- <u>Rhythm</u> the beat and flow of a poem.
- <u>Repetition</u> words or lines repeated in a poem.
- <u>Alliteration</u> a sentence or phrase where the majority of the words start with the same sound.
- <u>Onomatopoeia</u> words that make the sound.
- <u>Lines</u> a row of text in a poem.
- <u>Stanza</u> a group of lines in a poem.

## Types of Poetry

- <u>Free Verse</u> a poem that is free of rules and patterns
- <u>Diamante</u> a 7-line poem that uses nouns, verbs, and adjectives to compare and/or contrast two topics.
- <u>Haiku</u> a 3-line poem that uses a certain number of syllables in each line.
- <u>Limerick</u> A five line poem that uses a specific rhyme scheme and number of syllables in each line.
- <u>Cinquain</u> a 5-line poem using nouns, verbs, and adjectives to describe a topic.
- <u>Acrostic</u> a poem that uses the letters of a word to divide the lines of the poem.
- <u>Bio-Poem</u> a poem that tells information about a person.

## Poetic Devices: Figurative Language

- <u>Simile</u> comparing two unlike things using the words "like" or "as."
- <u>Metaphor</u> comparing two unlike things using the words "is" or "was."
- <u>Personification</u> giving human (person) qualities to things that are no human.
- <u>Hyperbole</u> an exaggeration
- <u>Idiom</u> a word or phrase that means something different from the literal meaning.
